Year 9 historians will be given an over-arching enquiry question, which they will be expected to answer as part of their end of year exam; "How did Political Ideologies affect people's lives in Britain and the world in C20th - present?" Each topic is broken down in to a smaller enquiry to help students build the bigger picture. During this time, students will continue to develop their historiographical skills, which will create the foundations to make them successful historians. All assessments will focus on both current learning and learning from years 7 and 8.
