Subject: Religious Education Year Group: 7



Our Year 7 programme of study has been purposely designed to challenge our students, broadening their understanding of Religious Education as an academic discipline. Thematically structured to complement the AQA GCSE specification they will move on to in KS4, students will build on their KS3 knowledge and enhance their understanding of the six main world religions as they progress through the modules. Students will study six units, each one focusing on a different ethical or moral theme to encourage independence and critical thinking skills.
